## PREFACE

I started work on the *Ciris* as a research student, and a commentary on lines 1–190 formed part of a dissertation granted the Ph.D. degree at Cambridge in 1970. I completed the main part of my work in the summer of 1975; I have been unable to take systematic account of periodical literature on the *Ciris* since that date.

In 1975 the book was longer than it is now. Succumbing to the πειθαράγκη of the publishers I have reduced its bulk by some 20%, and removed virtually all footnotes from the commentary. The reader may thus have cause to thank the publishers. On the other hand the process of pruning has forced me to be scantier in my treatment of other scholars' views and more dogmatic in the exposition of my own.

I have had the generous help of so many scholars that my gratitude must be briefly expressed. Professor F. R. D. Goodyear supervised my original Cambridge Ph.D. thesis; Mr M. D. Reeve made available to me his work on the textual transmission of the *Ciris*, and read and criticised my account of the manuscripts of the poem; Professor Franco Munari read and discussed with me a sizeable portion of the commentary in typescript; Mr A. S. Hollis, Professor E. J. Kenney, and Professor R. G. M. Nisbet all read and criticised virtually the whole book in a penultimate draft. Professor C. O. Brink, Mr P. G. McC. Brown, Mr J. Griffin, and Professor E. J. Kenney helped with the arduous task of correcting the proofs; the improvements which they effected were not confined to the correction of printers' errors. To all these distinguished scholars I offer my most sincere thanks. Whatever mistakes of fact, judgement or style that remain are the result of my own negligence or stubbornness.

I must also thank the Craven Committee and the Board of the Faculty of Lit. Hum. at Oxford for assistance with research expenses; and the British Academy for a subvention towards the cost of publication.

## C Two shorthand symbols

- [!] I use this symbol (borrowed from Helm) as shorthand for the following: ‘in this (or the same) metrical position of the line’.
- [\*] This symbol is short for ‘in my selected range of poets from Ennius to Juvenal’ (listed below p. 4). Negative inferences are to be drawn when I use [\*]. Thus at line 450, when I say that *liuesco* occurs [\*] at *Lucr.* 3.528, *Stat.* *Theb.* 4.58 and *Mart.* 8.51.3, I mean that these are the *only* occurrences in that whole range of poetry. (Often I simply cite the number of occurrences in brackets after each author; again negative inferences are to be drawn.)
